

THEATER REVIEW: "How to Load A Musket"



Is reenactment of the American Revolution, and particularly the Civil War, a hobby or something else? In "How to Load a Musket," playing at the 59E59 Theaters in New York City, we hear the words of men and women reenactors.

Most say it's a way to get away for the weekend and enjoy the camaraderie of family and friends. Some come to learn history, one to get a job as a reenactor, and others to honor

their ancestors. But since Charlottesville and the removal of Civil War monuments, these historical reenactments

have put reenactors in the cross-hairs of politics. While some refused to march in President Trump's inauguration, others, who mistakenly have been labeled racists, put themselves in harm's way at the reenactment of the Battle of Cedar Creek, where they had to be evacuated when a pipe bomb was found.


But the play does far more than raise these issues. It's an insightful way to learn why and how people choose to reenact our country's history. From "farbs" (those who are superficial reenactors and find ways to bring the comforts of the 21st century along) to those who experience a "gasm" when they find themselves in the zen of the moment, we learn a bit about why reenactors do it and what they think about it. Reenactors will even change sides, becoming a British or Union soldier, to balance a reenactment.

Despite one scene, which should be eliminated, I found the play to be enjoyable and well-acted by several Broadway stars who support Off-Broadway productions. The last show is January 26.

RAPHAEL SPITICCHI, VETERAN



This family photo is of my GGF Raphael Spiticchi (b. 1833), spouse Ellen Shute, and their children. Ellen Shute, a Boston native, is the direct descendant of patriot John Shute (4th or 5th GGD). Raphael and his brother Pietro/ Peter, arrived aboard the USS Constitution in 1849 at Boston Harbor. They did so by joining the USN, in Messina, Italy, which may have been commonplace in the day. It is hard to fathom that Raphael played in the band on this historic vessel, and that a band indeed existed. Another brother,

Carlo, arrived in NYC on July 11, 1856. Raphael was a musician by profession, as were his brothers. All three brothers were schooled at a private music conservatory in Messina, and all fought for the Union during the Civil War, serving at Fort Monroe, Fort Washington, and Fort McHenry. Raphael continued his musical profession, playing as a "multi-instrument" band member at the Waldorf Astoria for 25 years. His passing in 1893 happened at our "ancestral home"—107 Hall Street, Brooklyn.
